Displaced, but Not Lost

In his second letter to the Corinthians, the apostle Paul proclaims.

"For it is the God who said 'Let light shine out of darkness,' who has shone in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God in the face of Jesus Christ."

Then Paul goes on to say:

"We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed but not driven to despair; persecuted but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed...."

Paul is describing his experience as an apostle – one who has accepted the mission to share the gospel of Jesus Christ with a hurting, and frequently inhospitable and even dangerous, world.

I thought of this passage as I reflected on the experience of the COVID19 shutdown. So many of our routines came to a halt on March 13 ...staying home from school, from work, from sports, from shopping or going out to dinner, staying home from church. In the beginning there was much fear and anxiety. So many people were very sick, hospitals were near capacity, and many people were dying. Five months later we are still disrupted and displaced; encouraged to begin to go out and return to some of our routine, but hesitant and frustrated. There is still danger from the virus, and so there are precautions, and discomfort, and lots of anxiety. We hope for, and look for, a return to NORMAL, and it seems to recede toward the horizon, moving ever farther away as we wait and watch.

Our situation is not what Paul was describing, and it would be distortion to draw such a comparison. It is Paul's description of the experience of suffering which catches my attention: the reality of feeling

afflicted, perplexed, persecuted, and struck down, but NOT crushed, or despairing, or forsaken or destroyed.

I think of one of those childhood inflated figures with the weighted base; pushed or punched, the figure swayed and fell over, yet always rose upright again. I think of trying to hold a big beachball under the water - buoyancy is powerful!

The place between being afflicted and ending up crushed, being struck down and ending up destroyed, can be place of grace. It is a place where, if we wait and watch, we may recognize God's presence. God is with us in our affliction and disruption and worry, and grace will pick us up again, and encourage and empower us to carry on.

God is shining in our hearts, giving the light 0of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. We are displaced, but not lost.

Back to School?

For students and teachers of all ages, this time of year normally brings feelings of nervous anticipation and excitement about going back to school. Students ask themselves questions like, who are my teachers and what will they be like? Will my friends be in my classes? What will we be learning? What projects will we be doing in class this year? How much homework will I get? When is the last day of school? Similarly, teachers ask themselves, who are my students and what will they be like? What will I be covering this year? How much is in the budget for me to spend on supplies and materials? When is the last day of school? However, this year an entirely new set of uneasy questions are being asked and at the top of the list are, will we be physically going back to school and will we be safe or will school be virtual/computer based?

"Safe" is a very subjective word. Each individual has a very different way to define what being safe means to themselves, their family and their loved ones. The debate over what safe means and how to keep everyone safe during this pandemic is very sensitive and everyone has very strong opinions on what should or should not be done in relation to schools opening and the virus. There are so many factors involved with this reopening decision, such as, bussing to and from school for AM and PM classes, class sizes with recommended distancing, sanitizing and protective equipment just to name a few. I do feel bad for superintendents, administrators and anyone in the decision making process because whatever the decision is, it is almost impossible to please everyone. Most public schools in the state are starting this school year as a hybrid plan where students will start the year either going 2-3 days per week or only a portion of the day (AM or PM). North Haven is starting with 2 days per week in school and 3 days virtual/distant learning. Wallingford, where I teach wood shop, is starting with 2 to 3 days per week (depending on a rotating schedule) with morning and afternoon sessions and the other days as distant or virtual learning. I am happy that we are returning in some capacity. I had hoped that it would be 5 days per week but I understand the hesitation. However, one of my biggest concerns, besides the lack of socialization for students, is all the screen time that comes with virtual computer based learning.

Most of us practically live on our electronic devices which include smartphones, smart watches, tablets, laptops and desktops. Even before this pandemic hit us, physical human interaction had taken a backseat to facetime, texts, instant messages, posts and emails. As adults, we willingly take on all the extra digital interaction for our jobs or because it is our choice to do so. Like I stated before, my concern is with excessive digital interaction for the young developing brains of our children. I have read a lot about the negative effects of too much screen time for children. I know in the past they said the same about TV, but this is very different. TV, is generally a one way signal. They broadcast and you watch. Where the internet is endlessly interactive and addictive. It is designed to be so. For example, when was the last

time you went to YouTube and watched just 1 video? That is like opening up a bag of potato chips and eating just one. Most of us do not have the self-discipline to do that.

The amount of daily screen time that children and young adults average nationally is astounding. (Look it up). The numbers are jaw dropping and the statistics listed were taken before the virus hit us. I understand that this moment in time that we are experiencing is unprecedented for all of us. Virtual or distant learning was necessary and, for the most part, effective by keeping students engaged in learning even in a limited capacity. For the most part, teachers tried their best to facilitate and engage their students to the best of their ability. It was a true challenge and most stepped up to the plate. Many parents were thrust into an uncomfortable role of teaching their own children unfamiliar school subjects while trying to work from home (if they were fortunate to keep their jobs). Speaking for myself, the period after the schools closed was a difficult and stressful time. Trying to learn what is happening with the virus, what safety protocols should be demonstrated, finding meaningful activities and topics to engage my students, making sure my girls are on task and not losing my mind in the process. I am sure you can relate if you had similar circumstances.

I understand that I personally, have very little control over the decisions that are made about my school or the school my girls attend, but I can control how much screen time my girls have overall. However, virtual learning may consist of anywhere from 4-6 hours of screen time each day, several times per week, for an indefinite amount of time. That is very concerning and troubling to me. In my opinion, nothing can ever replace in person teaching, learning and being in the classroom (or in my case the Wood Shop). I pray for the day that school resumes in full session. I miss interacting with students, my peers, parents and yes, even administrators. I know I am not alone when I say, I miss being social and ask for God's help to get all of us through this.

I am excited and looking forward to going back this year. I understand the risk and accept whatever

outcome that may happen to me personally. I am willing to wear whatever protective protocol that is required as long as I am able to be physically in front of a class, teaching. My girls are nervous about going back but not because of the virus. They understand that there is a "sickness" (their word for the virus) that we need to be aware of and that we need to protect ourselves to the best of our ability. They are nervous the same way we were nervous about going back to school. Asking themselves the questions I listed at the beginning. My family recognizes the risk involved in going back to school during this pandemic and we are more than willing to send our girls, the most precious gifts that we have been blessed with, because we understand the importance and necessity of physical, in-person education on their development into well rounded, productive individuals.

Finally, I would like to tie in the reopening of Church worship since this parallels school reopening. The article that Chris Corcoran submitted for July/August covered this eloquently and if you have not had a chance to read it, I suggest you do. Our Re-Opening Team has been working diligently to try to accommodate anyone who would be interested in attending the return of in-person church service. It has been a challenge to meet all state and CDC guidelines, but I believe that those who are ready should feel safe with the precautions that are set in place. I completely understand if you are not ready, but for those of us who are, I look forward to seeing you in-person together in the presence of God.

Just as our communities across the country continue to face a "new normal" in the midst of a pandemic, The families of North Haven Congregational Church continue to SUNDAY SCHOOL find new ways to maintain a connection to one another without

in-person worship, church school, Bible Study, and meetings.

At the center of that survival is our strong faith in God. Although that faith may falter at times, we strive to nurture our faith and to feed our spirituality, thereby growing in our relationship with God. Accomplishing that task in the midst of a pandemic requires inspiration, creativity and flexibility. North Haven Congregational Church has met and continues to meet that challenge by finding new ways to keep connected.

Since mid-March, when In-person worship, Church school and meetings were suspended, North Haven Congregational Church moved to a "new normal" of live (virtual) worship. Our children, along with their parents, participated in weekly worship from the safety of their homes. Additionally, via email, each family was provided with a weekly church school lesson adapted from our lectionary-based curriculum. Each lesson included a scripture reading and/or Bible story, an opening prayer, a closing prayer, a list of questions to provide a platform for discussion and an activity.

Now, six months later, as we approach a new Church school year and continued uncertainty about when full, In-person worship and Church school can resume, the children and their families will continue to worship from their homes. However, beginning with the Fall semester, the children will have opportunities to interact with their Church school siblings via Zoom. Our Zoom church school is just one of several opportunities to be utilized to keep our children connected to one another, to their church family and to God; to grow in their faith.

The exact format of our "new normal" church school is yet to be decided. When the Faith Formation Team meets on August 30, decisions will be made regarding Rally Day, Church School and Bible Sunday. However, those decisions will be based upon discussions with and suggestions made by parents. Of course, at the center of our "new normal" church school will be to maintain the health and safety of our children and their families, while still encouraging and providing them with a nurturing environment to grow in their spirituality, their faith and connection to God.

Covenant of Gathering of the North Haven Congregational Church UCC

We covenant to work with each other and with our family and friends to keep our community safe and healthy.

We respect other people in the same physical space by wearing a face mask which covers nose and mouth the entire time we are gathered.

We show care for each person who is not from our household by keeping six feet safe distance.

We worship God through prayer and praise, and may speak or hum quietly but will not sing aloud while gathered.

We honor others by staying home if we are not feeling well or may have been exposed, knowing we can worship together whether gathered in person or in spirit.

We covenant to love, respect and care for each other through joyful times and in times of challenge, uncertainty and loss.

We worship as one body united in God's love and we listen together for God's still-speaking voice.

Introducing the ReOpening Team

The ReOpening Team is charged with the task of determining safety guidelines, precautions, and procedures in response to the COVID19 virus. These precautions and procedures will guide the planning for worship and church programming, and the safe, gradual return to in-person worship and church activities. The work of the ReOpening Team is guided by recommendations from the Southern New England Conference, UCC, and guidelines from the State of Connecticut, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the Quinnipiack Valley Health District.

The ReOpening Plan

The suspension of in-person worship, in-person activities, and in-person building use by community groups remains in place currently. The Church Office is open daily, and Julie Scweickert, Scott Morrow and Todd Swarney are working regularly in the building. Karlee Etter and Jeff Hutchins work in the building occasionally. The Food Pantry is in operation, with food distribution happens on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 10-11am. Sue and John Tibor, Nancy Mahoney, Wendy Glynn and Darlene Rogers assist in the food pantry as regular volunteers.

Worship services are livestreamed online on Sunday mornings with two or three people in the sanctuary. It has been decided that the online worship service will continue indefinitely, even as in-person attendance at worship resumes. **In-person worship will NOT** begin on Sept. 13; we hope that in-person worship might begin later in September, providing all precautions are in place, we have the safety supplies required, and a Safety Team has been recruited and trained.

The top priority for the ReOpening Team has been planning and preparation for in-person worship. There is also interest among church members to return to in-person activities in the church, such as meetings or fellowship groups. Other options for church gatherings should be considered first, with in-

person gathering at the church as a final option. Community groups are also interested in returning to in-person meetings or gatherings in the church. The Team feels it is important for in-person worship to begin first, and to take place several times successfully, before other in-person use of the building resumes. The guidelines and precautions for in-person gatherings in the building other than worship will be similar to those required for worship, with additional consideration of simultaneous gatherings, total capacity, and cleaning requirements. The Team hopes church groups and community groups can begin in-person gatherings, in accordance with precautions, in October.

Current precautions in the building include wearing mask and keeping safe, six-foot distance, as well as regular handwashing. The ReOpening Team has developed a list of screening questions addressing symptoms of illness, possible exposure to others, and travel outside of CT which will be used by all who enter the building.

The ReOpening Team conducted a survey among the congregation to learn of members' desire for inperson worship and activities, desired safety precautions, and level of comfort. The survey shows general high satisfaction with the online worship service. A small group in interested and comfortable returning to in-person worship with the precautions the ReOpening Team has recommended. A larger group is interested in other in-person events combining worship and fellowship, held outdoors at times other than Sunday morning. We will share more details from the survey in coming weeks.

The Team has discussed outdoor events, with seating in safely distanced household clusters, to be held on the north-side lawn, front or south-side lawn, or perhaps in the parking lot. The Team has also discussed a gradual return to in-person worship with clear guidelines and precautions.

The ReOpening Team proposes the gradual resumption of in-person worship in the sanctuary, observing established guidelines and precautions, on one or two Sundays per month, beginning initially

with a group of 16 worshippers, plus Safety Team and worship Leaders. It is our hope that in-person worship can begin in September, provided all safety supplies are in place, and the Safety Team has been formed and trained. Additionally, in consideration of survey responses, the Team recommends that staff and volunteers organize one or two outdoor worship/fellowship events per month, weather permitting, at a time other than Sunday morning.

The Team notes that in-person worship and programming may be suspended in the future in response to a rise in COVID19 cases, in accordance with guidance from the State of CT, Quinnipiack Valley Health District, and the CDC.

Guidelines and Precautions

- Screening questions to be answered by all persons prior to entering the building
- Masks covering nose and mouth to be worn at all times in the building.
- Maintain six-foot safe distance between members of different households
- Hand hygiene including use of hand sanitizer

In-Person Worship in the Sanctuary

- Pre-registration for attendance
- Screening questions and agreement to observe precautions completed in advance
- Screening questions and contact information confirmed upon arrival, and temperature taken
- Safely distanced seating between members of different households.
- Attendees bring a mask and hand sanitizer; masks worn covering nose and mouth at all times
- No passing of offering plates, prayer requests, or communion
- No singing
- No physical contact in greeting
- Ceiling fans off, window fans directed outward
- Plexiglass shields in front of lectern and pulpit


