Our vision, personal and communal, will guide us in this new year. Where do we want to be next January?

Worship is In-Person and Online



The 100th Anniversary of the Carnegie Hall Premiere of "Carol of the Bells"

It was in 1922 that the Ukrainian National Chorus was touring the USA (including Yale, New Haven, and Hartford). In his recent New York Times article about "Carol of the Bells," Rob LeDonne writes, "The Ukrainian composer and music teacher Mykola Leontovych first arranged the song, which has roots in Ukrainian folk music, christening it "Shchedryk" to celebrate the New Year (its title shared a root with "Shchedrist," Ukrainian for generosity). The Ukrainian American Peter J. Wilhousky, choral director and music director for New York City Public Schools, wrote and published new English lyrics in 1936 with the title "Carol of the Bells," adding the seasonal signifiers 'sweet silver bells' and announcing 'Christmas is here."

Abraham's Tent Postponed For This Year

For more than 10 years Before COVID, Abraham's Tent provided overnight hospitality, dinner and breakfast for 10-12 guests from Columbus House. The group of guests rotated among different houses of worship from mid-December through March, which freed up space in the Columbus House Shelter and the Overflow Shelter. NHCC has hosted on many occasions, and many members and friends of our congregation have volunteered in the program. During the pandemic, congregations were not able to host Abraham's Tent guests. There was great hope that the program could resume in some limited fashion this year.

Unfortunately Abraham's Tent will not resume this year. After careful consideration, the leadership of Columbus House felt they could not run the program this year. Challenges relating to a later start date, the need for hosting congregations and volunteers for at least 8 weeks of accommodation, staffing shortages and ongoing COVID concerns proved too great. The staff, the congregations, and the community remain committed to the program and hope to resume for next winter.

In the meantime, for those who are interested and able, there is the opportunity to volunteer in the kitchen at the Columbus House New Haven shelter. Up to 4 people can volunteer at the same time to serve shelter guests. Christmas Food Drive The 2022 Christmas Holiday Food Drive is nearly complete. Most of the pick-ups and deliveries happened on Sat. Dec. 17, with a few remaining to be completed the following week.

The Holiday Food Drive provided food for 150 households in this pandemic year. The North Haven Lions Club, the Rotary Club of North Haven, Arnold's Jewelers, and many businesses in town have made donations of food items and money. Turkeys were a big challenge at Thanksgiving, and the community came through with donations that provided for both Thanksgiving and Christmas. Overall food donations were lower this year, and particularly for the Christmas drive. We did a tremendous amount of shopping for items where contributions were low. We had wonderful and generous help from volunteers. Julie Schweickert set up online volunteer registration through the NHCC website again this year. Volunteers from the churches in North Haven helped with food collection, sorting, packing and delivery. A group of Girl Scouts taped all 300 boxes together for Thanksgiving, and again at Christmas! We are overjoyed our neighbors will be able to enjoy a more delicious Christmas.

Margret Hofmeister has been named the permanent Area Conference Minister for our Region. Rev. Hofmeister will begin her work in March. Rev. Hofmeister was ordained to authorized ministry through the New Haven East Consociation. It will be a joy to welcome her back in her new capacity on behalf of the SNEUCC!

We would like to set up a "call-out list" of people who are willing to clear snow (up to 6") from the sidewalks and stairwells at the church. The church has a snowblower and an electric shovel which are available for use. The Church will pay for this service.
