YOUTH SUNDAY MAY 21

As we approach the end of the school year, our children, during the next five weeks (April 16-May 14) of church school will be preparing to lead the congregation in worship on May 21. As last year, we celebrate our youth and children by providing an opportunity for them to lead the adults in worship. Last year the theme was the LORD'S PRAYER. This year the theme will focus on the church's liturgical calendar, or SEASONS OF THE SON.

SEASONS OF THE SON, or A RAINBOW OF SEASONS as Sharon Lee refers to the liturgical year, "The seasons of the church year are special times. Within them [those special times], Christians prepare, remember, celebrate, and live. Every time holds a promise when one is a child of God...In all times, there is joy and light within the glow of God's rainbow, a visible sign of God's promise."

Special resources and enrichment activities have been gathered, organized and planned for the weeks' church school lessons between April 16 - May 14 to help the children (and adults, too, for that matter) better understand each church season.

The church's six seasons have been divided into three seasons per group. The younger children in Grades PreK-Grade 2 will focus on the meaning, scriptures, hymns, and prayers related to the season of Christmas (April 16 lesson); season of Easter (April 23 lesson), and the season of Pentecost (April 30 lesson). The older children in Grades 3-7, will focus on the meaning, scriptures, hymns, and prayers related to the seasons of Advent, Epiphany and Lent. On May 7th and 14th, all the children will gather together in Carroll Hall to practice for May 21st (similar to rehearsals for the Christmas pageant each year).

It is my hope that as many children as possible can enjoy and actively participate in this special time in worship on May 21. This youth-led Sunday worship will provide leadership to the congregation, through the eyes of the children; to witness and grow in faith, to "actively" be in community, as well as provide affirmation of the joyful support of our congregation.

Review of Church Membership Records

The first step in the Church Membership Review being conducted by the Worship Team has been completed. A group of members (88) who have remained inactive since being contacted in 2019 have been dropped from membership. Several others from that group will receive a follow-up letter.

The next part of the process will be a fresh review of the current list of active members to identify those who have not been active recently. Those members identified as inactive will be contacted These members will be invited and encouraged to resume active participation. Should they choose, these members can request to be listed as inactive members for one year.

According to the church bylaws, active church membership includes regular participation in worship, sharing in the work of the church and of its Mission Teams, care for each other, and financial support for the church. Participation in any of these responsibilities constitutes active membership. Inactive membership is limited to one year, in the absence of extenuating circumstances.

We want our church membership records to be accurate and transparent. Active church membership determines the number of representatives the church may send to meetings of the Consociation and Conference. It also determines the financial support the church is obligated to provide to the Consociation.

Considering a 2023 On-Line Fundraising

Auction In response to previous communications about possibly holding an on-line fundraising auction, church members have advised they would donate an electronic keyboard, small vintage furniture item, stemmed glassware set, earthy pottery-like dish set and an etched glass pitcher. One of the donors stated "I hope the auction is a go" as they would rather donate their no longer needed items to the church than other options, and free their home of unused items. Background and More Information:

At our January annual meeting, our church members voted in a 2023 church budget that included budgeting \$5,000 income through fundraising.

The 2022 budget included \$3,600 for funds raised via fundraisers, and \$2,600 was actually raised, \$2,000 was from the 2022 (3rd annual) On-Line Fundraising Auction.

The first On-Line Fundraising Auction for our church was in 2020 in the beginning of the pandemic as a way to raise funds when in-person activities could not be held. We raised \$2,000 in that auction and in 2021, also over \$2.000 was raised for our church.

Items donated by church members that drew a lot of bids in our 2020, 2021 and 2022 auctions included a power lift chair, Karastan rugs, Old Town canoe, Thule car top carrier, fly rods, full length white fox coat, Lenox china, full length raccoon coat, antique wagon, Pyrex with sought after design, sterling silver, gold jewelry and Beatles albums.

The past auctions have benefited the church, drew interest from within and outside Connecticut, and often people remarked that it helped with things no longer used or needed in the home. A successful auction would need to include a few of the items as described above, but also smaller items. The smaller items help with the large items, and the large items help with the smaller items, in that if a bidder has an eye on something, they will often then bid on multiple items.

Food Pantry support from the Community

It takes a lot of resources to fulfill the needs of our 50 or so monthly food clients. This month we focus on some of the "behind the scenes" activities that you may not be aware of. While most of the food that we distribute comes from regular sources such as food collections brought to the Pantry by our church partners, or food obtained at no cost or low cost from CT Foodshare, or retail purchases, there are a number of other sources that we have come to depend upon.

For several years Paul Powers has organized and arranged for us to receive donations of bread from a

Pepperidge Farm distribution warehouse. There is an assortment of breads such as white bread, Italian bread, various sweet breads like cinnamon swirl or raisin bread, and several types of sandwich rolls, all of which are made available to our clients.

Crumbl Cookies has offered to provide end of day stock to our clients. An assortment of cookies is available, we never know what it will be, but we are sure these are enjoyed by the food clients. It's a really tasty treat. In case you are tempted to try them, Crumbl Cookies is located on Universal Drive.

Recently a truck driver called to ask if we could accept a donation of corned beef. The delivery was refused by the customer and the distributer did not want to take them back. We have been able to offer these to our clients. Nearly everyone to whom we offer these will accept them. These opportunities are rare, but when they arise we are happy to accept on behalf of our clients.

On two occasions since the beginning of the year we have received food donations from the Girl Scouts. The Scouts are very familiar with the operation of the Food Pantry as they have been helping during the Holiday Food Drives for a number of years. They were looking for additional ways to help and came up with a really valuable idea. The Scouts are given a budget and they shop for items for the Pantry. They are familiar with the items that are most needed, so they know they are purchasing the most desirable items. Upon completing the tasks, the Scouts are awarded a Merit Badge.

A local business, SFC KOENIG LLC, is currently holding their own food drive and will be delivering the food to us in June, along with a cash donation. The same company held a very successful drive last year and we look forward to seeing them again.

This is just a glance of the many activities that go on outside of the Pantry that helps to fill the needs of our clients. Each of these activities is very well appreciated.
