Tubing or Kayaking?

One of the special opportunities summer may bring is a visit to a river or a beach for a floating trip. At the beach it's nice to have a float or a wave board to give the extra buoyancy that enables a nice ride on the waves, or a gentle float.

On a river an inner tube or a kayak are two options. The inner tube will give a nice, gentle float as you drift with the current. There might be room for a cooler in which to bring some snacks and drinks. Tubes can be tied together in an impressive raft. A recent trip on the Salt River in Arizona gave me the chance to see large families and groups of friends, tethered together and listening to music from the speakers they'd brought along.

Another option on the river is to paddle a kayak, which is what Carol and I chose to do on the Salt River. The water was flowing nicely, thanks to lots of snow last winter that melted and pushed the reservoir levels up. There were quiet, gentle spots along the bank that offered a chance to look at birds. We passed a horse cooling off in the river! There were also spots where the riverbed dropped, or narrowed, and the current picked up. Nothing scary, but a strong current.

An inner tube is good for drifting along with the current. It's not easy to steer, and it's difficult to try to move in a particular direction other than the general flow of the river. A kayak, on the other hand, offers a good possibility to steer and to move across, or even against, the current. Paddling lets you do that. If you're drifting, you're going where the river goes. If you want to maneuver, you need to go slower, or faster, than the flow of the river. When you paddle, you can move in and out of the faster water to rest and look at the sights from the still water. Then you can move out and catch the narrow channel of faster water in mid-river, bouncing over the standing waves.

In life, as in the water, there is a time for drifting and a time for paddling. Drifting is peaceful and restful. Paddling lets you move around between restful pools and eddies, and swifter water. Paddling helps you avoid the rocks and overhanging trees and get to the quiet stretch of water beyond.

I hope your summer brings chances for both drifting and paddling!

widow and was feeling great loss. We became known as PLP- Parking Lot Picnic. We average about 7 although we have had as many as 11 meet for lunch. We know that when 2 or more are gathered, God is there among us.

We continued to meet in the winter of 2020-21 dressed in boots, heavy coats, scarves, mittens and with blankets! We were few in number but mighty with God's love. The following summer, a beloved church member, Ellie Harple, turned 90. Ellie couldn't have the party that Kathy had planned. We brought the party to her! We had a parade! We invited church members to join us in the parking lot to decorate cars with signs, streamers and balloons. Scott rode in a car until we were about ¼ mile from Ellie's house. He walked the rest of the way leading our parade in a top hat and sash! What a glorious day!

As the church began to open slowly, we met in Carroll Hall, safely distancing from each other. We sent cards to Shut-ins for Christmas and Valentine's Day. I am thrilled that this group continues to meet three years later! We have held each up in prayer, supporting each other in good times and through difficult times. We meet at noon on Tuesday. Feel free to join us anytime! We will welcome you with open arms!

I am honored to tell you that some members of PLP, Dot Pierce, Carol Mitchell, Cathy Welch and Merrilee Gladkowski, along with Karlee Etter are members of the Footsteps community, I spoke of earlier. I am proud to call them my friends! Dot and Greg Pierce were my sponsors when I attended my first spiritual retreat, a Tres Dias weekend, Nov. 11th-14th, 1999. It motivated me to accept God's calling. If you have questions about Footsteps, feel free to ask me!

Church School Missions Projects

After a few years hiatus because of the pandemic, "Noisy Offering" returned in February. The Faith Formation Team also agreed that the children would contribute to the church's yearly budget by collecting and redeeming cans and bottles. So far, the children have collected over \$200.00 in Noisy Offering. The funds from Noisy Offering will be divided in half with fifty percent going the church's Food Pantry and the

other half will be given to an orphan project in Africa. The redemption of cans and bottles has raised over \$260.00. Those funds will be presented to the church in September when the Fall church school year resumes in September.

Church School resumes its traditional school year with RALLY DAY on September 10, 2023. On that day the children will begin in worship with their parents and then go to their respective classrooms. After worship, parents may pick up their children in their classrooms and register each child. It is important for us to have a current record for each child, to be sure we have accurate information such as birthdates, grades and allergies (especially important, if any).

After Church on RALLY DAY, September 10, 2023 There are preliminary plans for a Back-To-School celebration after church. Whether we have a Bring-Your-Own-Picnic (BYOP) day and/or Ice Cream Social, all look forward to re-connecting with friends and church family, enjoying casual conversation, and family games. The Faith Formation Team will meet in August to finalize plans for Rally Day and do some tentative program planning through December. Once specifics for Rally Day have been determined, the Faith Formation Team will let the congregation know.

In May, a member of the Men's Fellowship suggested the possibility of having a Family-Friendly Movie Night (or afternoon; yet to be determined), in a joint effort with the Faith Formation Team. I thought it was a great idea, although as of this writing, specifics have not yet been determined. It is hoped that we may schedule our first (with more to come?) for September or October. We also agreed that the invitation to such a fun event should be extended to the neighborhood, thereby, perhaps encouraging new families to worship with us. More details will be shared once the Faith Formation Team meets in August.

I hope all of you have a safe, restful, pleasant Summer. I look forward to seeing you all again on September 10, 2023.

Cathy wants to thank all her NHCC family for your kind expressions of sympathy and for your prayers for her brother David over the last few months. Cathy wanted to share with you a little bit about who he was before his hospitalization.

David William Griffis (named for his grandfathers David McKenzie Carroll and William Benton Griffis) was born 13 months after me in Tokyo, Japan where my father was serving in the Army. My mother often said that Spooky, the family cocker spaniel, couldn't figure out what had happened because the spot under the high chair that had always been good for scraps with my older sister and me never had any scraps when David was being fed. She swore that she only had to get the spoon close to his mouth and he would suck the food right off! Perhaps that's why by the time he was four and I was five people thought he was my big brother. I would indignantly tell them "He's not my big brother, I'm his big sister!"


David loved trains; even if he was asleep when the car drove over railroad crossings he would say "Twain twacks." He kept that love of trains all his life, visiting train museums and small gauge trains wherever he found them. He was a prolific reader and was very interested in genealogy and history, participating in Civil War Re-enactments and able to discuss details of battles from the Civil War through WWII, though his Master's Degree was in Nuclear Engineering. He used that degree in his work for Pantex. There, he played a crucial role in the dismantling of nuclear weapons and the management of the nuclear pits. He devoted his entire professional life to this until his retirement in 2020.

He was also actively involved with Masonic organizations, including being part of the Shriners Band. His commitment to Freemasonry was evident in his enthusiastic engagement in various activities within the Otis Kheva Masonic community.

David will be deeply missed and forever cherished as a beloved brother, son, and uncle. He is survived by his three sisters: Mary Elizabeth Lynch of Colfax, NC; Catherine Pearl Welch of New Haven, CT; and Laura G. Hoyle of San Antonio, TX. Additionally, he leaves behind nine nieces and nephews who held a special place in his heart.

Safe Conduct Policy Training

The Safe Conduct Policy of our Church seeks to protect children, adults, employees and authorized ministers in a save Christian community. This effort extends to rules and procedures regarding hiring staff and supervising staff. The Ministery Leadership Board and Pastor Scott believe that part of keeping the Church safe involved training for staff and volunteers and educating the congregation. The MLB has directed that an online training program for staff and volunteers, focused on be watchful and preventing abuse, sexual abuse, and harassment, be implemented. This online training will be available for staff and volunteers to complete on their own schedule. That's it for structure, unless I have some North Haven Lions Club (or other Lions) event to plug.
