SAVE the DATE: Youth Sunday; April 28th

This year's theme for Youth Sunday is Caring for God's World, based upon scriptures from Genesis and Psalms. The creation story in Genesis 2:15; 19-20 provides human beings with an understanding of our place in the world. As creatures in God's world, we must work and take care of the lovely garden (Earth) in which God has placed us. Yes, human beings are part of God's creation but we also have a special role in that creation. We aren't just gardeners but "guardeners" of the creation. God expects us to take care of it. And It is that responsibility that defines our place in God's world. It demands that we closely examine our way of living, our impact on the environment, and our care for the world's creatures and resources in terms of that responsibility.

During the end of March through mid-April, church school lessons will focus on the creation story through scripture, Bible stories, and special crafts and activities. The children will hear the Creation Bible stories and explore numerous, practical ways to help care for God's creation; ways to become active Stewards in God's world.

Noisy Offering

On the 2nd and 4th Sundays of most months, the giggling youth of our church jiggle jars of coins that they just collected from worship attendees during our "Noisy Offering". The full collection jars are placed on our Communion Table. Although this always puts a smile on everyone's face, this is serious business! Our children, with assistance from the congregation, are raising funds for Heifer International; https://www.heifer.org.

Heifer International works in nineteen countries to help farmers, provide training, and other important works. About \$400 was raised last year in 2023. So far this year, approximately \$200 has been added to this sum of "noisy" coins. The funds will be donated to Heifer International this summer when the total collections are enough for Heifer to provide rabbits, goats, pigs and tree seedlings to several communities across the globe. Each of the gifts for Heifer International were chosen by the children in October.

As part of Faith Formation in our Church School, the children learn about mission work and helping those less fortunate, alongside their other church school teachings of bible lessons. The next dates for the noisy offering are April 14 and 28; May 12 and 26.

Holy Week music!

We were delighted to welcome friend of the church, Felicia Urbanski, to the very beautiful and meditative Maundy Thursday service this year. Felicia played violin lines to help accompany one of our most familiar and favorite anthems, "In Remembrance of Me" by Buryl Red and Reagan Courtney, as well as the traditional Taizé chant, "Jesus Remember Me". Donate a Dime and Save the Planet

Effective 1/1/2024, returning redeemable (beverage cans, glass, and plastic bottles} yields TEN CENTS per item. In 2023 from May through December, we collected enough returnables to contribute over \$700 to the fundraising line item of the church. This was when the bottle return rate was five cents. Now in the first three months of 2024, we have already made over \$175. I think that it is realistic to anticipate that we can earn well over a thousand dollars this year if we can double or triple the participation of members of the congregation. It is easy See below

Finding sources of money to contribute to the fundraising line item of the church is important; but it pales by comparison to the value of having our young children actively participating in a process that provides some funding to the church/community food pantry. In class we regularly talk about having an attitude of gratitude and helping others who are not as fortunate.

The real benefit, however, is that when the glass and plastic bottles and the metal cans are returned to a store or service provider less than 5% of the item end up in "land fill" sanitation dumps. When these same items are put to the curb as part of your town's single stream recycling program, however, they have 80 to 90% chance of ending up in a land fill or your local dump.

So how can you help? It is simple. First save the returnables and bring them to the church. If you have only a few, fine; just put them into the two recycling bins located near the exit of Carroll Hall or near the elevator entrance. If you have small bags they can be left next to the larger 50 gallon cans.

If you talk to your neighbors and family members, maybe they, too can participate in this process. It's not complicated, and the compounding results could be extraordinary. Make donations to the church, teach the children about caring for others and take a concrete step towards saving the planet.

Please use your normal recycling process for items that are not redeemable.

On-Line Fundraising Auction in the planning; Do you have items to donate?

Over the last four years, our annual on-line fundraising auctions raised funds for our church budget. The following items, and many others, were donated making the previous years' auctions a success: fulllength white fox coat, LL Bean and Orvis fly rods, fulllength raccoon coat, sterling silver items, motorized lift chair, Lenox and Noritake china, piano, Karastan rugs, oil painting, Old Town canoe, antique wagon, ceramic tree, rare pyrex, copier, Thule car carrier, 14 karat gold jewelry, large special dollhouse, hobnail turquoise milk glass, Beatles albums, Technic turntable, antique license plate, turquoise necklace. These graciously donated items drew the largest bids over the last four years for our on-line auction fundraisers.

Should we hold an on-line auction this spring/summer? Do you have items you no longer need or use that you would like to donate that would do well in an on-line auction? The more variety the better, the more unique the better. In addition to the items above, the following items also would do well, musical instruments, teak items, MCM (mid-century modern) items, a kayak, small furniture items, books published before 1900, Waterford items, antique, vintage or retro items. If so, please contact Patience Benassi or Priscilla Bradford or Martin Benassi or Martha Butterworth (The B team) and let us know. If we will have enough items to be donated, we can proceed to reserve a date for the auction and plan to move forward with our 5th annual on-line fundraising auction for our church's 2024 budget.

A weekly food distribution on Monday afternoons (from 1:00-2:00) has been added, staffed entirely by St. Elizabeth church members. Scott stated that this Ecumenical Food Council plans to meet more regularly going forward and hopes to expand its volunteer base.

Our discussions on both mornings ran the gamut from family, to sports, to health issues, to church. Regarding the last, the subject of how we men could best raise some funds for this year's budget was again broached. Stephen continued to promote his recycling plastic bottles and aluminum cans project as one with almost limitless potential, while I suggested conducting a Shred Event sometime in the fall as a way to raise some significant dollars.
