All Are Welcome

North Haven Congregational Church voted to become an Open & Affirming Church of the United Church of Christ on January 24, 2010. Open & Affirming churches of the UCC are those who explicitly welcome gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender persons into the ministry and fellowship of the Church. The statement adopted by the congregation speaks about binding together followers of Jesus Christ to share in worship of God, the mission of Christ's Church, to make God's will dominant in our lives, and to witness to the life teachings, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The statement proclaims "...we welcome as members of the North Haven Congregational Church women and men of all ages, tongues, races, abilities, circumstances and sexual orientations who confess Jesus Christ as Lord ..." The statement, and the decision to become an O&A Church followed an extended period of discussion, study and dialogue over a period of about two years.

"All Are Welcome" is the way we have expressed our openness and hospitality through the years since 2010. It is proclaimed on the banner in the front of the sanctuary and on the sign out front. At the request of the planners of the second annual North Haven PRIDE Day, we will open our Church doors for PRIDE Day (Sat. June 8, 12-4pm) to welcome visitors and to provide a safe and quiet space should someone visiting or participating in the PRIDE Day activities have such a need. Church members will be present to welcome those who visit and answer questions about the Church.

I believe a more proactive welcome, beyond our statement that "All Are Welcome" is needed in response to the efforts of North Haven PRIDE and the interest and curiosity of PRIDE visitors. A little prayerful reflection brings the realization that the experience of many LGBTQ persons and their allies have led them to assume they are not welcome or affirmed in a church setting. A smile, a handshake, and a spoken welcome will reflect the hospitality and fellowship we wish to offer. I encourage you to visit the Green on June 8 and participate in the many activities offered, as well as to consider being a welcoming greeter on behalf of our Church during the festivities.

Ministry Coordinator for Children EVERY Sunday in June is a FAMILY SUNDAY

During the month of June, every Sunday will be a Family Sunday. There will be lectionary-based Children's Worship Bulletins (or leaflets) available for use by the children during each worship service. The worship bulletins utilize child-friendly language to provide engaging activities, such as puzzles, games, coloring, and word searches which encourage the children's active listening during worship. Each bulletin reinforces the day's scripture and/or church seasons.

Each week's scripture are as follows:

June 2 - Mark 2:23-3:6 June 9 - Mark 3: 20-35 June 16 - Mark 4:26-34 June 23 - Mark 4:35-41 June 30 - Mark 5:21-43



SUMMER SUNDAY SCHOOL during July and August

This year, Summer Sunday School days are scheduled for July 14 and 28; and August 11 and 25; both the second and fourth Sundays of each month.

The focus this year will be one hero, and four heroines of the Bible: Miriam and Moses (July 14); Esther (July 28); Dorcas (August 11); and Lydia (August 25). Miriam and Moses', and Esther's stories are found in the Old Testament; Dorcas' and Lydia's stories are found in the New Testament. Each lesson about the day's hero or heroine will include various activities such as handcrafts, songs, rhymes, or a skits.

SUMMER BIBLE READING BINGO

This summer, each family has been given a Summer Bible Reading Bingo packet to provide some quiet, but valuable family time while motivating the children to read their Bibles during the summer and stay connected with God. It proves to be a fun, valuable resource to help the children learn how to use their Bibles, learn more Bible stories, learn more about God, and help with their reading skills.

Each family packet includes Summer Bible Reading Bingo cards for selected stories found in both the Old and New Testament, for either preschool (Ages 4/5) and/or elementary (K-7th grade), depending on the age of the children in each family. Each age-level packet includes a total of 24 Bible stories for each part of the Bible (for a total of 48 stories). The children may read as much of the Bible as they want, but for this game of Bingo, it is suggested that they read only one story each day. When they have read their selection of the story for the day, they may mark off the story read using the multi-colored stickers provided.

"On April 28th, NHCC celebrated our annual Youth Sunday. This year's theme was caring for God's world and included scripture selections from Genesis 1:1-2:2 and Psalm 8:3-8. Many of the children participated by creating art and reading scripture.

The sermon, entitled "Guardeners of God's Creation" reminded us that we are all part of God's creation; that as human beings we have a special role in caring for that creation.

Youth Sunday, as with each year, is a culmination of the lessons and themes presented throughout the church school year. Throughout the year, the children actively participated in caring for God's creation by collecting and returning recyclables. The money collected from the thousands of cans, bottles, etc. returned, also contributed to the general budget of NHCC. So, this year, not only did the children learn to better care for God's creation, but they also learned the valuable lesson of stewardship toward their church."









On May 19, many of our NHCC families/children received their Bible Reading Bingo packet and stickers for the summer. If you were not at church on May 19th, please contact Karlee, as packets have been compiled for each family.

On RALLY DAY (September 8th), the start of the new church school year, we will acknowledge all the children who completed a portion of, or their entire Summer Bible Reading Bingo cards. A special gift will be provided for each child in celebration of his or her summer Bible reading.
